- Satisfy accounting prerequisites for application to UConn’s Master of Science in Accounting (MSA).

- Discover the benefits of becoming a certified public accountant (CPA).
  - o Students preparing for the CPA exam may need additional accounting and business education to meet state education requirements to sit for the exam and the separate state education requirements for licensure.

Note: Storrs students may be able to complete the minor in three semesters under the following sequence: ACCT 3201 in the 2nd semester of the junior year, taking both ACCT 3202 and ACCT 4243 in the fall of their senior year, followed by ACCT 3260 in the spring. ACCT 3201 and 3202 are usually offered in Hartford in the summer.
