UConn Business and Economics in London allows you to earn academic credit through a custom-matched internship placement with a top global company. The program also offers UConn credit for management, finance, and economics courses.

Or study Business in Italy through the UConn Business in Florence summer program or the Paderno del Grappa program that runs during the summer as well as the fall and spring. Both programs offer upper-level Business credit.

UConn Social Entrepreneurship in Ecuador is an immersive opportunity that allows students to actively contribute to the local community while earning upper-level business credit. Students also hold a for-credit internship.

And University College Dublin Quinn School of Business offers both semester-long and summer programs that include internship opportunities and upper level Business coursework.

You can also consider the exchange programs where you can take Business classes in places like China, Sweden, Australia, the UK, Germany and Singapore

Don't forget, you are not limited to these programs. Consider taking electives or courses towards your minor abroad if you are interested in non-Business focused Education Abroad program.
